


Unit Planning

Let's prepare to teach a unit.




Part 1: How is student understanding developed?

- 2. Review the unit learning goals.
- 3. Look at the section narratives and learning goals.
- 4. Engage in a discussion with your grade-level team using the questions below.

What strategies and representations will students use to show their understanding of the learning goals?	
Learning Goals	
Describe the progression of understanding from one section to the next.	





Part 2: How is students' understanding assessed?

- 1. Complete the end-of-unit assessment, review each section's checkpoints, and examine the center summaries and pre-unit practice problems.
- 2. Engage in a discussion with your grade-level team using the questions below.

Describe how the progression of learning is evident through the checkpoints.	
How can the practice problems help you understand student thinking and determine their prior knowledge?
